61st ANNUAL LUNCHEON

The Fort Delaware Society's Annual Luncheon was held Sunday, February 6, 2011, and as President Bill Robelen promised 17 years before, it did not snow that day, much to the delight of the 65 persons who attended. As usual, the Christiana Hilton provided a beautiful setting and an excellent meal. There were some fine gifts given away as door prizes thanks to the generosity of Society Board members, the State Park Office and the staff of the Director Carolyn Hilton. Ranisczewski donated a handsome framed print of the Kalmar Nykle for a special raffle. Director Hugh Simmons had 2 tri-panel display boards; one with photographs of Society activities during the past year and another with archival photographs of Union and Confederate Officers who were at the Fort. In a departure from the usual guest speaker, members of the Reedy Point Players out of Delaware City presented three short one-act plays dealing with Civil War topics, complete with period costumes and props: "The Ghost of Lincoln and the Maid". "Alan Pinkerton's Interview with a female Confederate Spy", and "Grant and Lee's Meeting" to discuss the best way to handle the aftermath of the War. Everyone present was very pleased with this type of program.

WAL MART GIFT

The WalMart Superstore in Middletown showed its support of the Society by donating a new computer system complete with a large screen monitor and with plenty of capacity to handle our expanding data base programs to store our POW and Garrison records, Research Library contents, and archive information.

KIOSK COMING SOON

Thanks to the generosity of Crystal Trust, who funded the project, we have engaged the services of Kionetics to design and build a free standing touch-screen kiosk for visitors to our Sutler Shop during the season and for visitors to our booth during outreach programs to access our data base of over 41,000 names of Confederate POWs and Union soldiers who were at Fort Delaware during the Civil War. And if a photograph is in our files, that image will also be available to view. This is a marvelous addition to our efforts to spread information about Fort Delaware and the people who were there. We expect we will have the kiosk in our hands by the end of May. It is made with solid state components, with no moving parts. It just has to be plugged in to any 110v outlet, and we have the capacity to add new information as it becomes available.

FORT TO OPEN

Fort Delaware will be open to the public for its 2011 season on June 15 and will keep its normal schedule of Wednesday through Sunday. Large groups are encouraged to contact the Park Office at 302-834-7941 to make reservations. Any questions concerning special programs or schedules should also be directed to that same number. Severe weather may result in the Park closing, so to be safe, call ahead if you are unsure.

LCD PROJECTOR PURCHASED

With funds generated by last year's Wine Tasting events, the Society has purchased an Epson LCD projector. It will be available to guest speakers at our General Membership Meetings who want to use it for their Power Point video assisted programs. It will also save our renting one from the Christiana Hilton during our Annual Luncheon when it may be needed by our guest speakers. Because the former technology of using slide projectors is rapidly becoming obsolete (if not already so), most presenters are using Microsoft Power Point, which is far more flexible. With this new equipment, we are all ready for them.

CAP GRANT

With the assistance of Kimberlee Johnson of the Division of Parks and Recreation in Dover, the Society applied for and was awarded a Collections Assessment Program (CAP) Grant to underwrite a professional assessment of our archival collections. After being notified of the grant, we had to submit a 20 page questionnaire to the Heritage Foundation in Washington, DC that manages the CAP. After careful consideration, we selected Lois O. Price as our Assessor. She is on the staff at Winterthur Museum and has vast experience in conducting these assessment programs. Lois will visit the Society office during the week of June 13 and would like to meet as many of you as she can. With the CAP behind us, we will be far more eligible for additional grants to obtain funding for preservation and protection of our collections.

STANDARDS FOR EXCELLENCE

The Standards for Excellence Institute in Washington, DC is committed to raising the level of ethical and accountable practices in nonprofit organizations such as the Fort Delaware Society. In order to protect our nonprofit standing, it is in our best interest to participate in the Standards of Excellence Program. What this means is that we need to set down in writing (where we have not already done so in the past) the means by which we as a Society manage our affairs to comply with applicable local, state and federal laws. There are eight (8) Guiding Principles and fiftyfive (55) Performance Standards that we must address. This is indeed a lot of work, but President Bill Robelen, Vice-President Edie Mahoney and Director David Price are willing to undertake this effort on behalf of the Board. In reviewing the requirements, it must be noted that we are already in conformance with many of them and just have to state so in writing. Some other areas need to be addressed, but we are committed to producing a document that will satisfy the Standards of Excellence. When this material is complete, any interested Society member is welcome to review it in our office.

OFFICE OPEN TO VISITORS

The Society's office and Library at 33 Staff Lane in Fort DuPont State Park are open to visitors on the first and third Saturdays of each month from noon to 4 PM. All are welcome.

OUTREACH EFFORTS

One of the provisions of our Mission Statement that we take very seriously and for which we devote many hours, is to promote the Society as well as the Fort on Pea Patch Island. Here are just a few of the examples of our work in the communities of Delaware, Pennsylvania and New Jersey throughout the year.

Participate in the Heritage Commission's celebration of the 150th Anniversary of the Civil War, speak at Masonic Lodges, partner with Fort Delaware Park Staff to plan and participate in the Annual Victorian KidsFest at the Fort, staff a table at Newark Night and Newark Community Day, participate in the Annual Civil War activities at Manor College in PA, maintain wreaths at the monument at Finns Point National Cemetery, speak to various school groups, participate at annual Civil War events in Neshaminy Park in PA, Boy Scouts of America Jamboree in Teterboro, NJ, and at a similar event in Scotch Plains, NJ, staff a table with Fort and Society information at the annual Memorial Day celebration at Mt. Salem Methodist Church in Rockford Park in Wilmington, Marple Township and Pennypacker State Park events in PA, Mason College Civil War celebrations in NJ, and many more. Most of our Board members take an active part in this outreach activity. Not only is it a commitment of a huge amount of time, but considering the price of gasoline, this represents a significant personal financial contribution as well.
